In response to your letter dated 8 July 2014, to the Leigh Creek Health Services Health Advisory Council (LCHSHAC), we would like to respond as to why you should not reform South Australian Government Boards and Committees.

The LCHSHAC strive to achieve and help our community of Leigh Creek and surrounding areas in various related health and other issues.

We have been operating for numerous amounts of years efficiently and financially at low costs; our last year's financial costs were well under our budget of \$5000.

As outlined we submit to you the requested information regarding the effectiveness of our roles both financially and as a conduit between our community members which cannot be done any other way. The volunteers on the HAC are part of their community, known by the people, are approachable with an understanding of living in a remote area and the challenges this presents.

Our Advisory Council is a very pro-active committee, we also carry out bi-monthly informal meetings at various smaller communities (i.e. Marree, Nepabunna, Beltana, Copiey and Lyndhurst), to bring together their ideas and needs for the Health Service. These communities wholly rely on the operation of the Leigh Creek Health Service. Most of the communities here are dependent on their hospitals being opened 24/7 as accidents and illness are not restricted to office hours especially in relation to mining shifts, children and the large tourist presence.

One of the issues in accessing the "Your Say" website for individuals is the lack of availability of broadband communications and mobile access. A further issue is the very reason for our role as conduits for community members, to intercede for those who may not have the confidence to complain directly to a government website.


Further to these issues is the chronic disease component of the health care required here, targeting aboriginal communities, and mining personnel with Fly in, Fly Out components, the children and elderly.

In order to counter these issues, the 10 year plan was implemented with a 4 year plan within that time frame, to focus our energies on what was relevant to our specific communities. We decided to go out to all the communities to consult with the health service consumers, in a primary health care model, to ascertain any specific issues they experience. Our role to provide health care information was identified as a major component, giving rise to the production of a newsletter.


"Community Pulse" included:


- health information as highlighted on the SA Health website

- news from HAC meetings


This newsletter was available to the wider community via local businesses, post offices, emailed to outlying communities and printed in the local newsletter.















Available Tuesday to Friday - Before #:30am



Further to our role was the following:-

- Participated on selection panel for Director of Eyre and Northern Health Service
- With partnership of local school students, a DVD showing service delivery was developed and placed in the main waiting foyer of the hospital. Purchase of Monitor and installation being the only cost involved.
- Liaise with Pika Wiya Aboriginal Health Service personnel.
- Room-naming using Adnyamathanha language for the Hospital and Doctors' Surgery
- Community consultation at outlying communities which use the health service, at Nepabunna, Lyndhurst, Marree, Beltana and Copley. In these sessions we provide information regarding our role and direction, decisions made within the formal meetings and health care information in the form of pamphlets from SA Health. Most importantly, we were there to listen to community members regarding their concerns or ideas on health related issues.
- Identification via workshops of 4 main health issues within the 10 year plan to concentrate our efforts of understanding and implementation of strategies
- Development of an orientation package for new members
- Participation at Strategic Planning Consultation for area

Disbanding our Advisory Council will make it very hard for our community and surrounding area to obtain the information and help that we provide voluntarily and well within our budgeting guidelines.
